

CSG Summer Programs help students develop new interests and friendships in a fun, stimulating, learning-centered environment. Afternoon programs and specialty camps blend challenge and adventure that offer unique, confidence-building educational experiences.

The CSG campus is complete with an indoor pool, expansive classrooms, science laboratories, and state-of-the-art math and computer rooms. CSG has two libraries, an arts complex, two full-sized gymnasiums, locker rooms, and a facility specifically designed for the developmental needs of children between three and six years of age. Additionally, the 70-acre Kirk Campus provides students with wilderness activities, and includes the recreational advantage of the Zimmerman track, the full-sized Leo Yassenoff Athletic Field, and the Martha Coke Kieckhefer Tennis Center, all set in a beautiful wooded environment.

An experienced faculty, many of whom are regular CSG staff, provide a supportive atmosphere where each student's academic progress and sense of personal worth are fostered.

MORNING PROGRAMS

Early Childhood (Ages 3 - 5)

3 year olds attend the Half Day Program, 4-5 year olds may attend Half Day or Full Day Program.

HALF – DAY PROGRAM (8:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.)

A typical schedule for the morning might look like this:

8:30 – 9:30 Group activities, including a morning meeting, topic discussions, literature - based activities, and scientific explorations

9:30 – 10:30 Red-Cross certified swimming lessons

FULL – DAY PROGRAM

(8:30 a.m. – 4:30 p.m.)

The full-day program further extends the learning and activities of the half-day program through the afternoon.

A full-day schedule might look like this:

- 10:30 – 11:30 Creative expression, including drama, the visual arts, music and movement

Extended Care is available for an additional fee and includes outdoor play and self-directed activities. **Fee Half Day \$450, Fee Full Day, \$700.** The cost of lunch is included in tuition for all programs.

3 Year Olds

MOVIN' RIGHT ALONG!

First/Second Terms, 8:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.

Modeled on the same ideas and success of our academic year program, Movin' Right Along! focuses on the importance of community and cooperative play as learning experiences. Children will have the opportunity to learn through project-based explorations that will stimulate their ideas and curiosity. These explorations will center on connecting children with nature. Activities include structured play, games, creative experiences, the study of the natural world, and a literature experience/ story time each day. The program is open to boys and girls who are three years old on the first day of class and toilet trained. The program takes place in the Columbia House, an environment designed specifically for early childhood.

4 & 5 Year Olds

STRAIGHT AHEAD!

First/Second Terms, 8:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m. or 8:30 a.m. – 4:30 p.m.

First/Second Terms/Grades 4-5, 9:30 – 10:30 a.m.

First/Second Terms/Grades 4-5, 8:30-9:30 a.m.

Entering Grades 6 - 8

ENRICHMENT COURSES: THE EXPLORERS

ALGEBRA I HEADSTART

First/Second Terms/Grades 7–8, 8:30–10:30 a.m.

Review arithmetic operations with whole numbers, decimals, and fractions. There is an emphasis on integers, simplifying arithmetic and algebraic expressions, solving linear equations algebraically, applications of linear equations in solving word problems, basic rules of exponents, factoring of polynomials, and solving factorable quadratic equations. This class is recommended for students entering grade 7 or 8 who have adequate arithmetic skills and wish to get a head start on algebra in the fall. **Fee: \$250 per term.**

THE ART OF THE ESSAY

First/Second Terms: Grades 6–7, 9:30–10:30 a.m.

Grades 8–10, 11:30 a.m.–12:30 p.m.

This class will focus on the expository writing process by helping students learn to organize their ideas and structure them in a coherent essay. Emphasis will be placed on writing a solid introduction and on the analytical development of ideas. Writing improves with practice and we will be writing every day.

Fee: \$150 per term.

COMPUTER KEYBOARDING

First/Second Terms/Grades 4–8, 9:30 a.m.–10:30 a.m.

Accuracy in the touch system is stressed in this basic course on the alphabetic keyboard. Instruction will be offered on computers using Microsoft Word. The course emphasis is on letter/report formats and provides valuable preparation for word processing. **Fee: \$150 per term.**

THE MECHANICS OF WRITING

First Term/Second Terms/Grade 8–10, 10:30–11:30 a.m.

Has English grammar always been a mystery to you? Can't tell a participle from a predicate? In this course, we get down to business and review the basic parts of speech, action verbs, prepositional phrases, passive voice, and subject-verb agreement. And if that isn't exciting enough for you, we'll learn how to edit sentences and practice the proper use of semi-colons, commas, and apostrophes. It doesn't sound pretty, but great writing begins with a solid understanding of the basics and our goal is to help you be a strong writer. This course will also help you understand the structure of foreign languages more easily. Don't worry, we'll have fun along the way with wacky sentences, vocabulary, and visual exercises. Can be taken concurrently with The Art of the Essay at 11:30 a.m. **Fee: \$150 per term.**

MIDDLE SCHOOL MATH

First/Second Terms/ Recommended for Grade 7, 10:30–11:30 a.m.

Review arithmetic operations with whole numbers, decimals and fractions, operations with integers, simplifying expressions (order of operations), solving equations arithmetically, percentages, area and perimeter with polygons, as time permits. This class is recommended for students entering grade 7 in the fall. **Fee: \$150 per term.**

MIDDLE SCHOOL SPANISH

First/Second Terms/Grades 6–8, 8:30–10:30 a.m./ 10:30 a.m.–12:30 p.m.

This class introduces middle schoolers to the Spanish language. Emphasis will be on vocabulary, sentence structure, and conversation in an informal setting. This class is a perfect vehicle for enrichment or transition into an existing middle school Spanish program. Recommended especially for students entering grades 6, 7 and 8. **Fee: \$250 per term.**

ORIENTATION TO MIDDLE SCHOOL

First/Second Terms/Grades 6–7, 8:30–9:30 a.m.

This course guides students as they develop the writing and organizational skills necessary for a successful middle school experience. Students learn how to manage time effectively, take notes in class, and read and comprehend textbooks in history, science, and English. The course also focuses on

writing skills by helping students identify a thesis statement, organize their thoughts through webbing and outlining, and develop a sense of argument by supporting general statements with specific examples. There is also an opportunity to learn research techniques in the library. This course can be enhanced through enrichment courses in mathematics, reading comprehension, and computer keyboarding. **Fee: \$150 per term.**

SPACE CAMP *NEW*

First/Second Terms/Grades 6-8, 10:30-11:30 a.m.

Join us for some very cool space exploration! We will study the space station, the shuttle system, and become astronauts as we learn about training, daily routines and more. VAMPIRE HUNTERS *NEW*

First/Second Terms/Grades 6-8, 11:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m.

WEB MASTER

First/Second Terms/Grades 6-8, 11:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m.

This class will teach the essentials of web design through Dream Weaver and Photoshop. Students will be creating their own web pages, scanning, editing, and coloring images. Develop your own personal flair and expand your horizons this summer! **Fee: \$150 per term.**

WEIRD SCIENCE

First/Second Terms/Grades 6-8, 9:30-10:30 a.m.

Engage the imaginations of students by delving into the wonders of science. Enter the laboratory as we explore new horizons in chemistry and biology. The focus is on chemical reactions in the laboratory, space exploration, aerodynamics, and jet propulsion. Students make and launch their own rockets, so be prepared for action!

Fee: \$150 per term.

WORD PROCESSING/GRAPHICS

First/Second Terms/Grades 6-12, 11:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m.

Take a step beyond keyboarding by learning the essentials of word processing, including changing fonts, footnotes, file management, and the importation of graphics into text. Students utilize Microsoft Word and Powerpoint. The class also includes instruction in scanning both text and photographs, and the creation of slide shows for presentation purposes. The class is organized around several projects that are readily applicable to school classrooms. **Fee: \$150 per term.**

First Term/Grades 4-8, 9:30-10:30 a.m.

Discover the powerful influence of puppets in many cultures. Design and build your very own personal puppet. Construct it, give it costuming, and create a personality. **Fee: \$150.**

HEALTHY MIND, HEALTHY BODY

STRENGTH AND TONING

First/Second Terms/Grades 7–8, 10:30–11:30 a.m.

Welcome to CSG’s weight room. We’ll help you develop a program for increasing strength, cardiovascular endurance, and flexibility. Our staff will provide a variety of daily activities that promote and support a healthy lifestyle.

Fee: \$150 per term.

SWIMMING

First/Second Terms/Grades 6-8, 8:30-9:30 a.m.

Make a splash while you receive Red Cross-sanctioned swimming instruction. Whether you are a beginner, intermediate, or advanced swimmer, our staff of certified water safety instructors (WSI) will make you stronger and more confident in the water. **Fee: \$150 per term.**

TAE KWON DO

First/Second Terms/Grades 6–8, 11:30 a.m.–12:30 p.m.

This class offers an introduction to Tae Kwon Do, the ancient art of self-defense. Students will learn the basics of this martial art, including stances, blocks, and kicks. Emphasis will be on personal self-defense that focuses on awareness, escapes, and counterstrikes. Join us for this important and exciting opportunity. **Fee: \$150 per term.**

YOGA

First/Second Terms/Grades 6–8, 9:30–10:30 a.m.

Feeling stressed? Relax with us as you learn the essential breathing and movement techniques of yoga. This is a great way to connect body and mind for a healthy lifestyle. **Fee: \$150 per term.**

Entering Grades 9 - 12

ENRICHMENT COURSES

ALGEBRA I HEADSTART

First/Second Terms/Grade 9, 8:30–10:30 a.m.

Review arithmetic operations with whole numbers, decimals and fractions, with an emphasis on integers, simplifying arithmetic and algebraic expressions, solving linear equations algebraically, applications of linear equations in solving word problems, basic rules of exponents, factoring of polynomials, and solving factorable quadratic equations. **Fee: \$250 per term.**

ALGEBRA I REVISITED

First Term/Grades 9–12, 10:30 a.m.–12:30 p.m.

Algebra I Revisited reviews a comprehensive traditional Algebra I curriculum at a rapid pace. Classes are a combination of discussion and independent work with some lecture. Students are tested regularly and should expect to do at least one hour of homework each night. Algebra I is a prerequisite for this course, and is recommended for students with a passing average who plan to enroll in Algebra II in the fall. **Fee: \$250.**

THE ART OF THE ESSAY

First/Second Terms. Grades 9–10, 11:30 a.m.–12:30 p.m.

This class will focus on the expository writing process by helping students learn to organize their ideas and structure them in a coherent essay. Emphasis will be placed on writing a solid introduction and on the analytical development of ideas. Writing improves with practice and we will be writing every day. **Fee: \$150 per term.**

COMPUTER KEYBOARDING

First/Second Terms/Grades 9-12, 9:30–10:30 a.m.

Accuracy in the touch system is stressed in this basic course on the alphabetic keyboard. Instruction will be offered on computers using Microsoft Word. The course emphasis is on letter/report formats and provides valuable preparation for word processing. **Fee: \$150 per term.**

CRITICAL READING & WRITING SAT AND ACT PREPARATION

First/Second Terms/Grades 9–11, 8:30–10:30 a.m.

Verbal enrichment emphasis is on vocabulary growth, reading comprehension, grammar, usage, and word choice skills for written English. Successful SAT and ACT skills and techniques are stressed. This is not a remedial course, but one designed to strengthen and enrich. It is especially recommended for students who are entering eleventh grade and are interested in serious preparation for the PSAT, which is administered in the fall and serves as a basis for National Merit qualification. The fee for this course includes the cost of a workbook. **Fee: \$250 per term.**

GEOMETRY HEADSTART

Second Term/Grades 9-12, 10:30 a.m.–12:30 p.m.

Geometry Headstart introduces students to core geometric concepts and proofs that provide a solid foundation for the successful completion of high school geometry. This course is recommended for students who will be taking a geometry class in the fall, but can also prove beneficial for those who have just completed geometry and want to solidify their understanding before moving on to Algebra II in the fall. Students seeking a smooth transition to Algebra II in the fall may want to take it in association with Algebra I Revisited offered in the first term. **Fee: \$250.**

MATH SAT AND ACT PREPARATION

First/Second Terms/Grades 9–11, 10:30 a.m.–12:30 p.m.

This course provides a structured review of mathematical concepts and test-taking techniques for students planning to take the SAT, ACT, or PSAT/NMSQT during the school year. Students practice skills and review concepts in arithmetic, Algebra I and II, and Geometry. Most class work and assignments are designed in a format similar to the actual tests that provide familiarity with test styles. They allow students to experience various approaches that might be assumed in attacking a multiple choice problem in mathematics. A portion of each two hour class is used to simulate an actual test situation. It is especially recommended for students who are entering eleventh grade and are interested in serious preparation for the PSAT, which serves as the basis for National Merit qualification. Fees for this course include the cost of a workbook provided for each student. **Fee: \$250 per term.**

THE MECHANICS OF WRITING

First Term/Second Terms/Grades 9–10, 10:30–11:30 a.m.

Has English grammar always been a mystery to you? Can't tell a participle from a predicate? In this course, we get down to business and review the basic parts of speech, action verbs, prepositional phrases, passive voice, and subject-verb agreement. And if that isn't exciting enough for you, we'll learn how to edit sentences and practice the proper use of semi-colons, commas, and apostrophes. It doesn't sound pretty, but great writing begins with a solid understanding of the basics and our goal is to help you be a strong writer. This course will also help you understand the structure of foreign languages more easily. And don't worry, we'll have fun along the way with wacky sentences, vocabulary, and

visual exercises. This class can be taken concurrently with The Art of the Essay at 11:30 a.m.
Fee: \$150 per term.

TRANSITIONS TO HIGH SCHOOL

Second Term/Grades 9–10, 8:30–9:30 a.m.

This course will guide students as they develop the writing and organizational skills necessary for a successful high school experience. Students will learn to manage their time effectively, take notes in class, and outline textbook chapters in science, history, and English. Students will develop library research skills and discuss testing strategies in both subjective and objective analysis. Basic skills will be strengthened in grammar, sentence structure, mechanics and word usage, and students will learn how to write essays based on outside reading assignments. Special attention will be given to individual writing problems. **Fee: \$150.**

WORD PROCESSING/GRAPHICS

First/Second Terms/Grades 6–12, 11:30 a.m.–12:30 p.m.

Take a step beyond keyboarding by learning the essentials of word processing, including changing fonts, footnotes, file management, and the importation of graphics into text. Students utilize Microsoft Word and Powerpoint. The class also includes instruction in scanning text and photographs and the creation of slide shows for presentation purposes. The class is organized around several projects that are readily applicable to school classrooms. **Fee: \$150 per term.**

ACADEMIC CREDIT COURSES

GEOMETRY

6 week course, First and Second Terms/Grades 10-12, 8:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. Full Year/1.0 credit

This full-year course focuses on the basic concepts of Euclidean Geometry and the development of logical reasoning, including the formal method of proof. Concepts of coordinate and three-dimensional Geometry are integrated with plane Geometry. Students employ a drawing/ construction software program throughout the course. **Fee: \$700.**

CIVICS

First Term/Grades 11–12, 1–5 p.m. One semester/.5 credit

This course pursues a thematic approach to the political and social responsibilities required by residence in a nation served by a democratic constitution and tradition. Emphasis is placed on the development of critical thinking skills necessary for participation in social, civic, and political processes, recognition and consideration of moral dilemmas and ethical awareness, an appreciation of civic involvement and constructive social criticism, and the development of interpersonal skills necessary for the resolution of social conflicts. Students will study the primary documents of our democratic heritage with special emphasis on the Constitution as it relates to everyday situations, major Supreme Court decisions, and a discerning analysis of civil liberties. **Fee: \$425.**

FOUNDATIONS IN VISUAL ARTS

First Term/Grades 9–12, 1–5 p.m. One semester/.5 credit

Foundations is a studio-oriented course designed to serve the needs of students who wish to continue the study of art as well as those who may not take another visual art course in high school. Practical experiences in a variety of media and processes such as drawing, painting, printmaking, fibers, and sculpture may be included. Historical and cultural references accompany the study of each activity. Class discussions, as well as individual critiques, aid in developing a sketchbook/journal, and portfolio. A comprehensive written exam will be administered. The goal of the course is to strengthen students' abilities to express their ideas, both visually and verbally. **Fee: \$450.**

HEALTH I

First Term/Grades 9-10, 8:30-11:30 a.m.

One semester/.25 credit

In conjunction with Physical Education, Health I is an introduction to personal wellness. This course also emphasizes responsible decision-making, a life free of drug, alcohol, and tobacco abuse, nutrition, and issues relating to human sexuality. Also included in this course is certification in Adult CPR/AED and Standard First Aid. **Fee: \$425.**

HEALTH II

First Term/Grades 10-12, 1-3 p.m. June 21, 23, 25, 28, 30, July 1, 7, 8. One semester/.25 credit

Taught as a seminar, Health II delves into topics of concern specific to college-bound women, including women's health issues, "party laws," the effects of drugs, prevention of diseases and disorders, the aging process, and achieving balance in one's life. Also included is recertification in Adult CPR/AED and Standard First Aid. **Fee: \$325.**

PHOTOGRAPHY I

Second Term/Grades 9–12, 1–5 p.m.

One semester/.5 credit

Prerequisite: Foundations in Visual Arts

This course is an introduction to black and white photography in which fundamentals of camera operation, film developing, and printing are taught. There will also be a focus on digital techniques, such as image capture, manipulation, and output processes. Critiques and class discussions aid the student in grasping the unique qualities of this medium. **Fee: \$450.**

PHOTOGRAPHY II

Second Term/Grades 10–12, 1–5 p.m.

One semester/.5 credit. Prerequisite: Photography I

Photography II builds upon the skills and techniques learned in Photography I, utilizing more advanced traditional photo techniques in the darkroom with the option of exploring a digital format. Students may use Photoshop to paint and edit photo imagery, thereby going beyond traditional photo technology. They will develop a portfolio of their work and take a written exam. Students will need to supply a digital camera. **Fee: \$450.**

PUBLIC SPEAKING

First Term/Grades 10–12, 8:30–10:30 a.m./

10:30 a.m.–12:30 p.m.

One semester/.25 credit

This course teaches basic methods of public presentation from idea to performance. Students will deliver several different types of speeches. There is no prerequisite for this course. **Fee: \$275.**

TECHNOLOGY PROJECT

First Term/Grade 9, 10:30 a.m.–12:30 p.m./1–3 p.m.

Second Term/Grade 9, 10:30 a.m.–12:30 p.m. One semester/.25 credit

This course is designed to build students' knowledge of Tablet PCs that will be issued to them as 9th graders. Students work on various projects that are designed to help them manage an ever-changing selection of hardware and software. Projects include web design, photo editing, Microsoft Office applications, and specialized Tablet PC programs. **Fee: \$275 per term.**

PHYSICAL EDUCATION COURSES

PHYSICAL EDUCATION GAMES AND ACTIVITIES

First Term/Grades 10–12, 8:30–10:30 a.m.

One semester/.15 credit

This course offers students opportunities to participate in team related sports. Students will acquire the knowledge and skills necessary, as both participant and spectator, to appreciate sports popular among college students and young adults. **Fee: \$275.**

PHYSICAL EDUCATION LIFETIME ACTIVITIES

First Term/Grades 10–12, 10:30–12:30 p.m.

One semester/.15 credit

This course allows students the opportunity to participate in a variety of activities. In each unit, students will learn the necessary skills, strategies, and techniques necessary to participate fully. Fitness activities will accompany each unit. **Fee: \$275.**

WATER SAFETY AND SELF DEFENSE

First Term/Grades 10–12, 3–5 p.m.

Second Term/Grades 10–12, 2–4 p.m. One semester/.15 credit

This course will allow students to develop comfort in and around water, improve swimming strokes, review safety guidelines when involved in water activities, including boating safety and personal safety techniques. Self-Defense, taught by IMPACT, will help students develop techniques using their voices

as well as their physical capabilities.

Fee: \$325 per term.

Entering Grades 1 - 2

GREAT DAY! AFTERNOON ADVENTURE PROGRAM

The Afternoon Adventure Program is an enriching experience on many levels. Students prepare for all activities so each is age-appropriate, educationally valuable, and personally memorable. For some groups additional activities may include archery, floor hockey, and excursions to Magic Mountain, the Columbus Zoo, and Westerville Golf. Time is set aside for free swim in the pool on a regular basis. The hours are 1-4:30 p.m. (some days until 5 or 6 p.m.) with Extended Care available until 6 pm. It's adventure all the way...Go for it! **Fee: Half day \$450 per term, Full Day \$700 per term.**

First & Second Terms

The Afternoon Adventure Program for children grades 1-2 allows exploration of weekly themes through arts and crafts, field trips, games, and guest speakers. Students will also enjoy outdoor play and free swim in the pool, as well as time for quiet reflection. The hours are 1-4:30 p.m., with Extended Care available until 6 p.m.

FIRST TERM

WEEK 1: EMERGENCY 911!

Have you ever wondered what happens when the alarm sounds at a fire station, or what happens at the police department when you call for help? We'll travel to both Columbus police and fire departments, take a tour of the State House, then check out where all the packages go when we visit the main branch of the Columbus post office.

WEEK 2: THE GREAT OUTDOORS

Get your hiking boots out and hope for lots of sunshine. Hiking at Cynthia Woods and the outdoor games at Camp Lazarus will give us an opportunity to enjoy playing outside. This week will definitely be an adventure!

WEEK 3: CREATIVITY CREATIONS

Bring your imagination and enthusiasm as we create our own theater productions with back-drops, costumes, and music. A member of the Phoenix Theater production company will be on hand to guide us through the creative process. We will also visit a local theater for inspiration and to learn how they operate.

SECOND TERM

WEEK 1: KID CUISINE

Students will become food critics as we travel the city learning about nutrition and tasting the foods of our many cultures. Italian, Latin, and Asian restaurants will be a few of our stops. If we're not too full, we'll try our hand at cooking an extra special treat for ourselves!

WEEK 2: EXPLORING COLUMBUS

Have you ever wondered how many different and unique places there are around Columbus that can be fun for you and your friends? This is the week to find out! We will travel around the city, making stops at different spots that are guaranteed to be fun and entertaining!

A trip to Wendy's Gymnastics will have us tumbling all over the place, COSI will give us an opportunity to discover whatever comes to mind, and roller skating will allow us to enjoy the cool indoors. CSG FUTURE STARS TENNIS PROGRAM

Grades 1-3!

FIRST AND SECOND TERMS GRADES 1-3, 1-4:30 P.M.

CSG's Future Stars Tennis Program introduces children in grades 1-3 to the game of tennis in a way that is fun and age-appropriate. Players provide their own racquets and instructors focus on hand-eye coordination, foundation strokes, basic rules, tennis games, and good sportsmanship. Entering Grades 4-8

CSG GIRLS' BASKETBALL CAMP

Grades 4-8, 1-4 p.m., June 28-July 2

The primary goal of the CSG Girls' Basketball Camp is to actively engage student athletes, both physically and mentally, in a complete basketball program focusing on components of the game and movement fundamentals, fundamental skills progression in offensive and defensive play, and rules and procedures. The emphasis is on developing basketball skills in preparation for competitive team play. Enrollment in the program is limited to 50. This number is maintained to ensure a student/coach ratio of 10:1, thus providing the personal instruction necessary for individual development. All students are evaluated at the onset of the program and placed in instructional groups that are designed to allow them to progress with peers at their own skill levels. **Fee: \$120**

Activities will include:

- Fundamental skill stations (ball handling, shooting, perimeter skills, post skills)
- Components of team offense
- Components of defensive play; player to player, multiple zones
- 1-on-1, 3-on-3, and 5-on-5 team competitions
- Individual skill competitions – i.e., speed spot shooting
- Basketball rules and game procedures

CSG GIRLS' DIVING

Grades 4-8, 5-8 p.m., June 28-July 2

Join us for this unique opportunity for personal instruction on a range of dives. **Fee: \$120.**

CSG GIRLS' FIELD HOCKEY

Grades 4-8, 9 a.m.-noon, June 21-June 25

The primary goal of the CSG Field Hockey Camp is to provide a thorough and complete field hockey training program that focuses on skill fundamentals, game strategy, and team play. Enrollment in the program is limited to 60 players. This number is maintained to ensure a student/teacher ratio of about 15:1, thus providing the personal attention necessary for individual progress. The teaching staff is personally selected for its experience, maturity and character, and is trained to provide the highest standard in field hockey instruction. All game play and instruction will take place at the Geupel Field on CSG's main campus. We will also use our air-conditioned gymnasium for indoor skill-building techniques and competition. **Fee: \$120.**

CSG GIRLS' GOLF

Grades 4-8, 9 a.m.-noon, June 21-June 25

This camp will emphasize driving and putting techniques as well as daily matches. **Fee: \$120.**

CSG GIRLS' LACROSSE

Grades 4-8, 1-4 p.m., June 21-June 25

The primary goal of the CSG Lacrosse Camp is to provide a thorough and complete training program that focuses on skill fundamentals, game strategy, and team play. Enrollment in the program is limited to 60 players. This number is maintained to ensure a student/teacher ratio of about 15:1, thus providing the personal attention necessary for individual progress. **Fee: \$120.**

CSG GIRLS' SWIMMING

Grades 4-8, 5-8 p.m., June 21-June 25

This camp will emphasize stroke technique and conditioning for swimming athletes. **Fee: \$120.**

CSG GIRLS' VOLLEYBALL

Grades 4-8, 1-4 p.m., June 28-July 2

The CSG Girls' Volleyball Camp combines an emphasis on fundamental techniques with an active program of match play. All student-athletes are evaluated at the onset of the camp and placed in instructional groups that are designed to allow them to progress in instructional groups that are designed to allow them to progress with peers at their own skill level. Beginning students learn the fundamentals of the game by focusing on footwork, underhand passes, setting, hitting, and the serve. Students on an intermediate/advanced level refine their basic skills and work on game strategies, offensive/defensive skills, and challenging match play. Personal instruction will be provided to ensure individual development. Enrollment in the program is limited to 24 players. This limit ensures a student teacher ratio of approximately 10:1, thus providing the personal attention necessary for individual progress. **Fee: \$120.**

CSG GIRLS' SOCCER

Grades 4-8, 9 a.m.-noon, June 28-July 2

The first focus of the CSG Girls' Soccer Camp will be to establish excellent ball-handling fundamentals, for this is where exciting, skillful soccer begins. We will practice techniques for receiving, keeping, and sending the ball properly through drills designed to be amusing and stimulating. In a non-position-specific setting, we will emphasize offensive and defensive skills and tactics. We will focus on position-specific skills when playing short-sided and full-field games. The second focus of the week will be team play. Well-timed and well-placed passes between two or more players can beat any defense. We will also emphasize communication skills on the field. The campers will receive reminders and explanations of the rules of soccer as necessary, tips for training on their own, and advice on how to prevent injuries through proper stretching, conditioning, and strengthening. **Fee: \$120.**

CSG GIRLS' TENNIS

Grades 4-8, 9a.m.-noon, June 28-July 2

A unique opportunity for stroke development, rules, tennis games, point play, and good sportsmanship. **Fee: \$120.**

UPPER SCHOOL GIRLS' SPORT CAMPS

Entering Grades 9-12

Refunds/Late Fees

For those who have paid tuition in full by the established deadline, cancellations will be subject to a fee of 10 percent of the total tuition, or \$50, whichever is greater. Those who have placed a deposit on tuition and withdraw prior to the payment deadline will forfeit the entire deposit.

Please note that there is a \$25 fee per student per term for late payment or for registering after the payment deadlines.

Discounts‡

Family Discount: If two or more children are enrolled for full-day programs, a Family Discount of \$100 per term, per family, will apply (excluding the August in Action Program, credit courses, and sports camps).

Early Bird Discount: If the registration form and full tuition are received by April 24, you may deduct twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) from the total amount due (excluding the August in Action Program, credit courses, and sports camps).

*Discounts are to be taken per family, not per child.

Progress Reports

For CSG's credit courses, students will receive a written report of his/her progress at three and/or six week intervals. These reports will consist of a summary of the student's development and effort as well as either letter grades or pass/fail ratings as appropriate. At the request of the student or parents, the Director will forward final reports of achievements to the school of each student for grades 9-12.

Course Credit

Students desiring credit for courses taken during CSG Summer Programs should consult their individual school authorities to determine their policy regarding work done during the summer. The Director will be happy to provide complete course descriptions and any information necessary for credit assessment.

Extended Care Program

For an additional fee of \$250 per term (\$75 per week for August in Action! Program), informal care is provided for children age 3 years through grade 6 (accommodations can be made for grades 7-8) both before and after regular school hours. Students may be dropped off in the morning as early as 7:30 am, and they may stay in the afternoon as late as 6 pm. Families have the option of using the program every day or on an as-needed basis, and all care is supervised by our staff in the multipurpose room in the Lower School.

Lunch and Snacks

A daily snack will be served to children ages 3 through grade 3 who are enrolled in the Morning Program. Daily snacks are included in the Afternoon Programs and Weekly Adventure Programs as well. Fresh fruit will be served each day as one of the snack options, and a wide variety of kosher snacks are available.

CSG will serve a nutritious, cafeteria style lunch each day between 11:30 am and 1:15 pm, beginning June 21 and ending July 30. August in Action! participants should provide their own lunch. The cost of the lunch program is included for all full day students and half-day preschool students. Half-day students in grades one and up may purchase lunch for a fee of \$80 per term, and the entire term must be paid upon registration. No half-day students will be allowed to purchase lunch from CSG on a day-to-day basis.

Tuition and Payment Deadlines

Full tuition should accompany your registration. Only those registrants who submit full payment for all programs before the discount deadline date are eligible for the Early Bird Discount.

Registration will be accepted only when accompanied by a minimum deposit of \$100 per child, per term. Fees for all classroom, sports, and field trip activities are included in the tuition. Full payment for each term must be received on or before the deadline dates listed in order to maintain registration and/or be eligible for any discounts.

Pro-rating Fees
